

I am so excited that Dianne Herman, Lucy Anne McKosky and Jacqueline (Jacquie) Housel, the Chair of Sinclair Community College's Department of Sociology, Geography and Social Work, will represent the League at the University of Dayton's Imagining Community Symposium: Creating a More Equitable Dayton. The symposium will take place on April 7 and 8, 2022, at the PNC Hub at the Dayton Arcade. Their presentation will examine Social Inequity and Voting and will take place on Friday, April 8 at 9:15 AM.

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Jacquie invited me to visit Sinclair's Mapping Equity Project exhibit, which illustrates the inequities that arose because of the "red line" that divides our community along racial lines; these include access to healthcare, poverty, and lack of greenspace. Particularly alarming to me was how the life expectancy of neighbors who live only a few minutes from one another can differ up to twenty years, depending on their address.

With support from the League's Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Committee, we set out to explore how these inequities might affect voting. Social Inequity and Voting will use maps from the Mapping Equity Project as well as maps created by Sinclair student, Jeremy Lisco, which illustrate how social inequity may affect voter turnout, and – spoiler alert – it does. Where you live matters.

I hope that you'll be able to join us as we talk about the maps and how we, as members of our community can find ways to ensure that all citizens have the tools they need to exercise their right to vote.

Program Planning

The LWVGDA Program Planning Committee met virtually in February to recommend and discuss issues/topics for consideration during the 2022-2023 program year. Since 2022 is an "even" year, discussion revolved around the League of Women Voters' recommendation that local Leagues continue to support The Campaign for Making Democracy Work as the national focus. The group voted to support the national focus and brainstormed program ideas for the upcoming year. The program topics chosen by the committee were forwarded onto LWVUS. They include:

- Expanding Voter Access
- Fighting Voter Suppression
- Money in Politics
- Redistricting
- Bail Reform
- Natural Resources with an emphasis on water safety

Planning is already underway to educate citizens about how the new district maps may affect where and for whom they vote. Look for hot topics on the League's *Empowering You* monthly program, hosted David Bodary, Vice President of Program, as well as watch parties, and bringing in changemakers who help craft reform.

2022 Dangerous Dames of Dayton Honored

League members and the community gathered to honor the 2022 class of Dangerous Dames on March 8, 2022.



Keynote speaker, **Verna Williams**, Dean of the University of Cincinnati's College of Law presented "The Forgotten Founding." She shared the story of Congressman James Hinds,

who advocated for the civil rights of former slaves, and was assassinated in 1868 by a Klansman because of his beliefs. Her fascinating presentation revealed that today's political climate resembles that of the 1860s when politicians tried to suppress the voting power of Black citizens through redistricting and accused the opposing party of election fraud.



In 1974, League member **Carol Graff** was the first woman appointed to the Board of Zoning Appeals in Beavercreek and the first female Trustee of Beavercreek Township where she

actively participated in the incorporation effort of the City of Beavercreek. She sat on the Beavercreek City Council for over a decade and was elected Beavercreek's first female Mayor in 1986.



Reverend **Dawn Martin** founded Girls Empowered and Mentored to success (GEMS) with the mission to mentor girls and their families from grade 6 until high school

graduation, and help them to go on to college. Since 2007 Martin has mentored over 35 young women, 30 of whom enrolled in college.



Reverend **Vanessa Ward**, Co-Pastor Emeritus of Omega Baptist Church, founded the Omega Senior Living Project and Project Hope. She is the President of the Omega

Community Development Corporation and oversees the organization's mission of providing services that help to develop and improve the lives of the youth, the families and the community of Northwest Dayton.

The League of Women Voters of the Greater Dayton Area (LWVGDA) Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Explanation

Defining Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion

Diversity, equity, and inclusion are mutually reinforcing. Increased inclusion is associated with increased equity; the majority of organizations with higher inclusion and equity also have greater demographic diversity.

DIVERSITY

Diversity includes all of the similarities and differences among people, not limited to gender, gender identity, ethnicity, race, native or indigenous origin, age, generation, sexual orientation, culture, religion, belief system, marital status, parental status, socioeconomic status, appearance, language, accent, ability status, mental health, education, geography, nationality, work style, work experience, job role function, thinking style, personality type, physical appearance, and political perspective or affiliation.

EQUITY

Equity is an approach based in fairness to ensuring everyone is given equal opportunity; this means that resources may be divided and shared unequally to make sure that each person has a fair chance to succeed. Equity takes into account that people have different access to resources because of systems of oppression and privilege. Equity seeks to balance that disparity.

INCLUSION

Inclusion is an ongoing process, not a static state of being. Inclusion is the dynamic state of operating in which diversity is leveraged to create a healthy, high-performing organization and community. Inclusion refers to the degree to which diverse individuals are able to participate fully in the decision-making processes within an organization or group.

An inclusive environment ensures equitable access to resources and opportunities for all. It also enables individuals and groups to feel safe, respected, engaged, motivated and valued for who they are and for their contributions toward organizational and societal goals.

DEI Lens

A DEI lens is a way of examining a program, a process, a product, etc., with regards to how it is perceived by a variety of communities, voices, and perspectives, and what, if any, barriers may exist that are preventing it from being equitable or inclusive of everyone.

- Who is involved in the process?
- Who will be impacted?
- What are the intended and unintended outcomes?
- Does this align with our vision for an equitable and inclusive organization?
- What changes could be made to make this more equitable?

DEI Focuses On

- The Individual analyzing our individual biases and diverse dimensions.
- The Organization examines ways in which the League can represent our community through the course of equitable and inclusive participation with collective leadership opportunities.
- The Community analyzes the way in which our League is helpful to our partners in uplifting underrepresented voices and acknowledging the value in democracy.

Voters Guide Sponsors Needed

The *Guide* has provided voting information for the Greater Dayton Area since we were founded in 1920. It is printed in English and Spanish and distributed in the Dayton Daily News, the newspapers of AIM Media, the *Oakwood Times*, *Yellow Springs News* and *La Guardiana* and delivered to over two hundred businesses, high schools and churches, as well as the Montgomery and Greene County libraries.

It provides information about candidates' views, written in their own words - we do not correct spelling, grammar or punctuation – and pro and con information about issues. The *Guide* also provides useful information to help citizens be ready to vote by providing voting hours, voting options, eligibility and ID requirements.

The *Voters Guide* is provided as a community service and is not a fundraiser, but we can't do it without your help. Each donation helps to underwrite printing and distribution costs, which increase each year. Your tax-deductible gift of \$100 will put the *Guide* into the hands of 1000 voters! 
